



THERE'S A SOCIAL WORKER IN THE LIBRARY?

For the past year there has indeed been a social worker in the library and the *Friends* were interested to learn more about him.....so we invited **Bruce Fiske** to our board meeting in August. Here he is, in his own words:

There's a Social Worker in the Library? I can't count how many times I have heard this. When I started here last year, I was a new staff member to the Library and a newcomer in the recently emerging field of Library Social Work. People from all walks of life visit the Library; many bring with them a vast array of social problems. Many problems can be resolved quickly, such as when a young man arrives fresh off a bus looking for emergency housing and work, or when a troubled patron needs someone to talk to. More complex cases include help with immigration documentation, tenancy issues, housing forms, by-law enforcement issues, and mental health resources to name a few. Situations requiring urgent attention include helping those in crisis or when vulnerable people or children are involved. Sometimes there is a happy ending with a steady job and secure housing; in other cases, social work referral services are more ongoing due the need for follow up, monitoring and review.

Another important aspect of my work is providing training and support for Library staff working with vulnerable customers.

So there is a Social Worker in the Library. My hours are 10-4:30 Monday to Friday for any patron who is having a difficult time or just wants to say hello. I am here and ready to assist. If you have further interest about the Library Social Worker please call or drop by: visitors are always welcome!

My Library is... the St. James Branch

"What a sad want I am in of libraries, of books to gather facts from! Why is there not a Majesty's library in every country

town? There is a Majesty's jail and gallows in every one. " Thomas Carlyle, 1832

It wasn't quite that desperate in St.
James as there was a public library
"next door" in the city of Winnipeg
but it was miles away and St. James was
an energetic growing city in the 1950s.
So, in April 1954, the Lions Club of St.
James championed the idea of a local
public library and one year later, housed
in two rooms at the St. James Collegiate,
the library was officially opened. Pretty
fast work!

Of course, as the population kept growing, the two rooms proved inadequate in no time.

So the Lions and the people of St. James got busy again. The move next door to a fine new building in February 1958 made St. James the second city in Manitoba to build its own public library. The head librarian, John Russell described St. James as "an intellectual community".

The location is such a plus for this branch - a short walk to the west and you're in charming little Bruce Park on the

Assiniboine River. Another stroll will take you through Deer Lodge Place and the bridge to Assiniboine Park. And along Portage you'll find good coffee, ice cream, even a good used book store. In the library there is always a show by the St. James Art Club. Art exhibits have quite a history here, starting with a Canadian Painting Show in 1960 which featured such names as A.Y. Jackson, Lawren Harris, Arthur Lismer, Emily Carr, LeMoine Fitzgerald!

My relationship with the St. James Library goes back to the early 60s when I lived in a little apartment nearby. After a sojourn in Regina I returned to St. James with two small

daughters in tow. After another exile in Wolseley, we've returned to St. James and – thanks to my volunteer work for the Friends of the Library Fall Book Sale - I'm happily here in my old library several times a week.
